Briefly describe your role and responsibilities as an intern.

I was considered a marketing intern for the 2013 Training Camp in Oxnard, California, but my roles varied from marketing to operations to public relations. What has your internship taught you about this career field?

What classes best prepared you for the job?

The Spears Business Career Center is a great resource for any business student. I was able to use some resources such as résumé development and interview preparation to help secure my internship with the Dallas Cowboys. Being involved on campus was also a key building block to my success. Without being involved in various clubs and organizations on campus and also contributing to many charities off campus, I don't think I would have been molded or shaped into the man I am today.

Being involved on campus is essential for personal and professional growth while in college. I was fortunate to have the opportunity to be a judicial board chair for my fraternity and help govern a 120-man house. Also, I was elected to be on Homecoming House Decoration Steering and that committee was in charge of the safety guidelines and budget for all of the house decorations, as well as planning and coordinating walk-arounds for over 90,000 people. Lastly, I was on the first Student Government Coordinating Council where we planned and advocated student government activities on campus and also developed new ways to get students involved.
